## Glenturret 12 Years (2024)

The Glenturret 12 Years 2024 can be seen as the "big brother" of the Triple Wood 2024. With a clear [age statement](#) and a noticeably richer color, this whisky promises more depth and structure. Bottled at 46.4% ABV, it brings a combination of spice, fruitiness, and a creamy texture.

### TASTING NOTES

#### NOSE

Right from the start, it's clear that this whisky is a more refined and complex version of the Triple Wood. Cinnamon and oak set striking accents, accompanied by dark berries and a hint of dark chocolate. An inviting graininess adds warmth, while vanilla provides a subtle creamy sweetness.

#### PALATE

The initial impression is wonderfully creamy, followed by a pronounced spiciness. The oak imparts a pleasant depth, while cinnamon and sugar resemble an intensely dark, caramelized pastry. Dark currants bring a fruity note, well-balanced by a light acidity. Overall, a powerful and well-structured taste that skillfully blends spice and sweetness.

#### FINISH

The finish remains pleasantly soft and subtly oak-driven. A warming note runs throughout, accompanied by fruity sweetness and a distinct cinnamon spice. Light spice notes add a fine complexity, while the balance between wood and fruit remains intact.

### THOUGHTS

#### MARCEL

A whisky that simply delights with its creamy texture and spicy fruit notes – perfect for cozy evenings when you're looking for some depth and character. Sure, the price isn't a bargain, but anyone who appreciates mature flavors and an intense tasting experience will be very well served here.

#### SASCHA

The Glenturret 12 Year 2024 impresses with its balanced interplay between spicy oak and fruity acidity, supported by a creamy mouthfeel. Despite its obvious maturity, it lacks a bit of final precision in places, which makes the somewhat higher price feel a bit questionable.
